Ethical Standards and Best Practices

The journal expects all participants, authors, editors, and reviewers to conduct themselves with honesty, accountability, and respect for intellectual property rights. IPVarna Law Review adheres to ethical principles addressing issues such as plagiarism, data integrity, authorship criteria, conflicts of interest, and confidentiality in line with widely accepted industry standards.

Plagiarism Policy

IPVarna Law Review enforces a strict zero-tolerance policy towards plagiarism. All submitted manuscripts undergo plagiarism screening using reliable detection software. Manuscripts with a similarity index exceeding **15%** will be rejected outright. Should plagiarism or unethical conduct be identified post-publication, the journal will investigate thoroughly and take appropriate corrective actions, including issuing corrections or retractions.

Corrections and Retractions

In cases of substantive errors or ethical breaches identified after publication, IPVarna Law Review will promptly address the issue by publishing corrections, expressions of concern, or retractions as warranted. These actions will be transparent and documented to preserve the integrity of the scholarly record and inform readers accordingly.

Authorship Criteria

Authorship is reserved for individuals who have made substantial intellectual contributions to the research and manuscript preparation. All listed authors must approve the final manuscript and accept responsibility for its content. Practices such as honorary, gift, or guest authorships are strictly prohibited.

Redundancy and Duplicate Publication

Manuscripts must be original and not under simultaneous consideration or previously published elsewhere. Authors are required to disclose any prior dissemination of related work. Duplicate or redundant publications will be rejected, and violations may result in sanctions.
